OXFAM Symposium Highlights Urgent Need for Gender-Informed Policies in Pakistan

In a bid to bridge the information and knowledge gaps surrounding women's issues and the impact of COVID-19, a symposium was organised by OXFAM under its Women's Voice and Leadership - Pakistan project, at a hotel in Islamabad on February 10, 2023. Among the esteemed guests was Director Uks Tasneem, who presented the OXFAM-Uks groundbreaking study 'Bridging the Information and Knowledge Gaps'.

The report sheds light on critical aspects of the situation current of women in Pakistan and effects of the pandemic. One of its key goals was to extend a veritable knowledge media base practitioners, women's



rights organizations (WROs), parliamentarians, and government officials.

With a focus on media reportage, the study highlighted the concerning trends of increased gender-based violence (GBV), early child marriages, and forced marriages during the COVID-19 pandemic. By doing so, it provided a valuable resource for policymakers to understand the urgent need for pro-women policies and essential social and economic reforms.



Moreover, the report mapped out the socio-economic vulnerabilities of women in specific occupations, such as home-based workers, health workers, and domestic workers during the COVID-19 This comprehensive crisis. understanding can pave the way gender-informed resource allocations, creating more for supportive environment women across various sectors.



UKS-DW CONSTRUCTIVE JOURNALISM TRAINING FOR A SOLUTION-ORIENTED MEDIA LANDSCAPE IN PAKISTAN

February 8, 2023 was the final day of the Uks-DW Constructive Journalism training. Trainee journalists were awarded certificates in recognition of their successful completion of the intensive programme in Islamabad.

The training marked the culmination of the "Exploring 'News Message System' through the lens of Constructive Journalism in 2023 – A Scale-up Project," which spanned over five months. The project advocated for constructive journalism among journalists and media gatekeepers in Pakistan.

The project had various components, including online surveys and media monitoring. Uks, as part of its primary work, conducted media monitoring to establish a baseline for research on reporting about floods. The findings from this monitoring and on-ground research were used to develop guidelines for constructive journalism tailored to the Pakistani media landscape.

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Additionally, Uks worked directly with decision-makers from eight major media houses, to identify institutional obstacles hindering constructive journalism.

Uks also engaged with beat-reporters in three batches for training. The training aimed to equip reporters with the necessary tools and techniques to embrace constructive journalism in their work.



By increasing the number of constructive news stories within the 'news message system' of Pakistan, the project aimed to contribute to a more informed and solution-oriented media landscape in the country.

EMPOWERING WOMEN'S HEALTH: UKS & DR. TAHIRA KAZMI'S IMPACTFUL ADVOCACY AT LLF

Media heads expressed their commitment to exploring the adoption of constructive journalism principles in their organizations, emphasising its potential to empower communities and address societal challenges.



AAGAY KYA SERIES: "BUILDING A BETTER FUTURE: HOW CONSTRUCTIVE JOURNALISM CAN SHAPE PAKISTANI MEDIA"

Uks initiated a podcast series on constructive journalism in Pakistani media called Aagya Kya, brought to audiences by Uks Digital Studio and Deutsche Welle. In this series, we explore the concept of constructive journalism in the context of Pakistan with 12 veteran media personalities and activists from diverse fields. This podcast series was produced as part of a scale-up project called "Exploring News Message System in Pakistan". The 5-month project advocated for the adoption of the principles of constructive journalism among journalists and media gatekeepers of Pakistan.



Our guest speakers spoke about the need to embrace constructive journalism guidelines, ways to increase the number of constructive journalism news stories in the 'news message system' and the barriers to the adoption of the techniques of constructive journalism. We believe that each episode of this series will serve as a valuable resource for journalists and media practitioners looking to improve the quality of their reporting and contribute to a more positive and constructive public discourse. Mediamatters for Women

Our pick of the positives, the downright dangerous and the cautionary tales that turned up in the media in the last 6 months

The Good

There is something magical about a good romantic comedy; it not only makes you laugh and feel good about yourself but also makes you believe that a couple can deeply and affectionately love each other. This is precisely what happens when one watches Hum TV's "Fairytale." The story of Farjaad and Umeed has taken young Pakistan by storm and is currently the most talked-about drama in the country online. However, for Uks, this drama has shattered some preconceived notions that deserve attention.



Firstly, Pakistanis cherish a compelling love story where the male protagonist is not an abusive misogynist, and the female lead is far from a damsel in distress. While love stories in Pakistan have always been popular onscreen, they often tend to be offensive, mean, cruel, and stereotypical. The male protagonist in "Fairytale" may be complex, but he possesses a tender-hearted, respectful, and mature demeanor. On the other hand, the heroine is portrayed as erratic, funny, vulnerable, and positive. She loves for the sake of love without demeaning herself, and her popularity alone is proof that Pakistanis can appreciate a variety of female characters onscreen. Here's to more stories that promote healthy and loving relationships like Umeed and Farjaad's!

Moreover, this drama's depiction of family relations is worthy of praise. The siblings genuinely love and support each other, which is a rare occurrence in stories where siblings are often portrayed as lustful demons or honour-driven monsters. Additionally, while there is a complication between the father and the heroine, it is not portrayed in a perverse or cruel manner. The father remains a reasonable man who comes to see reason without subjecting the heroine to intense pain. Truly, Hum TV has exceeded expectations with this show!

The Bad

On the opposite end of this spectrum is Geo's "Tere Bin," a show that has undeniably earned the dubious distinction of being the worst show of this year. While "Fairytale" has garnered a substantial following among Pakistanis who appreciate its positive portrayal of relationships, it's disheartening to note that "Tere Bin" has also found an audience among those who seem to favor a more toxic narrative.



What's comical about this show is that the creators sacrificed its initial popularity in pursuit of higher ratings, which is quite perplexing. "Tere Bin" essentially revolved around the enemies-to-lovers trope, a story where a man and a woman deny their feelings for each other until they inevitably succumb to love, a classical and often enjoyable scenario. The Pakistani audience was initially captivated by this setup. Even though the male protagonist exhibited some misogynistic tendencies, there was an effort to maintain a delicate balance to keep his character human, especially in his interactions with the female protagonist. This was the initial reason for the show's popularity.

However, the turning point came when the scenes shown in the serial's promo strongly suggested that the male protagonist had assaulted the heroine, causing the nation's affection for the show to sour. The creators chose to present this scene indirectly, but no one was fooled by their approach. While there still exists a legion of fans who adore this show, a significant majority condemned the creators for using such a plot device. It's a ploy that unfortunately has become a standard feature in many Pakistani shows. To make matters worse, even the lead actors supported and participated in this scene. This only underscores that the portrayal of misogyny in Pakistani dramas is a deliberate and cynical choice, with little regard for the harm it can cause to a population already facing immense challenges in this country.

Allowing him to persist in his work sets a dangerous precedent and encourages others to follow suit. It's high time we put the final nail in the coffin of his diminishing reputation!
