EDITOR'S NOTE

Women of Parachinar: Where Are They?

November was a devastating month for the people of Parachinar. Sectarian violence claimed the lives of more than 110 people, leaving many more injured. With the area's history of ongoing unrest, this incident is one of the deadliest Pakistan has seen in recent years. even though political turmoil elsewhere in the country has overshadowed the tragedy, it has still received daily coverage in the news.

What hasn't been extensively covered, however, is the plight of the women affected by this violence.

In a country where women often face insurmountable challenges and where victims of assault and violence are frequently overlooked, it's important to recognise that women victims of such tragedies endure unique hardships. During any crisis or disaster, whether natural or human made, women get neglected and sidelined by the media which somehow doesn't bring out voices and concerns of women, who are already marginalised segment of our population.

Firstly, no accurate count of the female victims has been provided. While efforts to confirm fatalities continue, the absence of gender-specific data can create the impression that women were unaffected by the conflict. A detailed demographic breakdown-by age and gender-would offer an understanding of how the violence impacted Parachinar and whether the effects were targeted.

Secondly, little is known about the condition of the women and girls who were injured. What medical care are they receiving? How severe are their injuries?

Are mental health services being provided to them? In a society that expects women to endure pain silently and with "dignity," the toll of such expectations can be immense. Injuries - both physical or psychological - can lead to ostracism, paricularly if these women are no longer able to fulfill their traditional roles. Coverage of their stories is vital to raise awareness of their needs and the challenges they face.

Lastly, the survivors. If male relatives, i.e. husbands, fathers, or sons, have been killed, what happens to the women left behind? What legal hurdles must they overcome to confirm the identities of their loved ones or to get compensation? Women from conservative areas like Parachinar often depend on male family members for mobility and decision-making. Without such support, even obtaining basic legal documents can become a monumental challenge, especially in a society where widows are expected to remain in mourning at home. Are these women receiving the legal and social support they need to navigate their new realities?

Highlighting these issues isn't about looking at the tragedy through a "gender-biased" lens - it's about acknowledging an aspect of the conflict that cannot be ignored. The women of Parachinar are also victims of this terrible violence, and they deserve empathy, attention, and tangible support. They must not be left to shoulder the burdens of grief, injury, and systemic neglect alone.

Pakistan's media, civil society, and policymakers must step up to ensure that the voices of these women are heard and their needs addressed. For them to rebuild their lives, we must start by recognising their suffering and standing with them in solidarity.

SINDH DRAFTS COUNTRY'S FIRST TRANSGENDER EDUCATION POLICY

Pakistan's first-ever Transgender Education Policy draft was approved in a meeting chaired by Sindh's Minister for Education Sardar Ali Shah on Wednesday.

The policy proposes adding a separate category for transgender children in admission forms for schools and colleges alongside male and female options. It also includes reserving job quotas for transgender individuals during teacher recruitment. The draft will be presented to the cabinet for legal approval.

WOMAN FOOD OFFICIAL BEATEN, HARASSED IN 'RETALIATORY' RAID

The Federal Investigation Agency (FIA) in Sargodha has registered a case against multiple police officers, including former SHO of Piplan police station, Malik Fayaz, and three others, for allegedly torturing women, violating the sanctity of their home, and abusing their authority. During the raid, they arrested women from the household, subjected them to severe physical abuse, and transported them to the police station, where further mistreatment occurred. The incident stems from an earlier FIR filed by Assistant Food Safety Officer Aneela Shamshad against Irfanul Haq, a bakery owner in Piplan.



STEPS URGED TO IMPLEMENT LAW AGAINST RAPE IN BALOCHISTAN

24 November The Legal Aid Society, in collaboration with the Ministry of Law and Justice, the Balochistan government, and the United Nations Population Fund (UNFPA), hosted a pivotal consultation to strengthen the implementation of the Anti-Rape (Investigation and Trial) Act, 2021, and establish Anti-Rape Crisis Cells in Balochistan. They underscored the importance of multi-sectoral collaboration, uniting government officials, legal experts, and key stakeholders to address challenges and develop survivor-centric strategies.
