EDITOR'S NOTE

The Rise of Women in Digital Media: Are TikTok and YouTube Redefining Female Narratives?

In Pakistan's deeply patriarchal media landscape, where women's voices have long been muted or distorted, a quiet revolution is unfolding. On platforms like TikTok and YouTube, women are telling their stories, challenging rigid social norms, and reclaiming their identities in ways that mainstream media has systematically denied them.

From discussing mental health and body positivity to calling out misogyny and violence, female content creators are pushing boundaries and reshaping narratives. Yet, this bold digital empowerment comes at a dangerous cost - relentless online harassment, slut-shaming, and threats of violence. And as Pakistani women continue to carve out space in the digital world, the state remains woefully unprepared to protect them.

Creators have used TikTok to build massive followings, while YouTubers are fostering honest conversations about women's experiences. These women are not just influencers -they are cultural disruptors, challenging stereotypes and pushing back against the one-dimensional portrayal of women in traditional media.

However, the backlash has been brutal. Women who dare to be visible are met with trolling, slut-shaming, doxxing, and threats of physical violence. In some cases, the attacks have spilled offline, as was seen in the tragic murder of social media star Qandeel Baloch in 2016.

The message is clear: Women may be allowed visibility, but only on society's terms. Step out of line - speak too loudly, laugh too freely, exist too boldly - and the digital patriarchy will strike back with a vengeance.

Pakistan's cybercrime law, the Prevention of Electronic Crimes Act (PECA) 2016, was meant to protect citizens from online abuse. Instead, it has been weaponized against activists and journalists, while offering little to no protection for women facing digital violence.

This is where Uks Research Centre's initiative, Safe Words, Safer World, becomes critical. As part of its ongoing work on gender and media, Uks collaborated with WACC to tackle the alarming rise in digital abuse faced by women and gender minorities in Pakistan.

The initiative focuses on creating safer online spaces, documenting misogynistic abusive vocabulary in Urdu and Punjabi, and pushing for policy reforms that protects victims.

While local law enforcement has failed women, international platforms like TikTok and YouTube have also done little to shield Pakistani female creators from abuse. Content moderation policies are weak, and reporting mechanisms often lack cultural context, leaving women vulnerable to targeted attacks.

If social media platforms want to support Pakistani women's empowerment, they must invest more in local moderation teams, establish stronger policies against gender-based harassment, and provide content creators with tools to filter and block abusive comments.

Despite the threats, Pakistani women are refusing to be silenced. They are building communities, telling stories, and reshaping what it means to be a woman in this country. But this fight cannot be fought alone.

We need structural change — stronger implementation of cybercrime laws, gendersensitive law enforcement, and safer digital platforms. Initiatives like Safe Words, Safer World are critical in this battle, but without the backing of the state and tech giants, the burden will continue to fall on the shoulders of women who are already risking their safety to speak out.

The rise of women in digital media is one of the most powerful cultural shifts of our time. But if we fail to protect these voices, we risk losing not just individual creators, but an entire generation of women who are daring to rewrite the narrative - and reclaim their power - one post at a time.

VOCATIONAL CENTRE FOR WOMEN SET UP IN LACHI

A Vocational Training Center (VTC) exclusively for women has been established in Lachi Tehsil under the Kohat Division Development Project (KDDP).

The center provides specialized training in sewing, beauty, and computer skills, according to a press release issued here. A total of 260 women will be trained at the center within a year. The women will be divided into four batches, each with 65 trainees, focusing on developing skills in dress designing, beauty and skin care, and computer skills.
