# EDITOR'S NOTE

### Drowning Voices, Forgotten Women

When the floods come, they don't just wash away homes, cattle, and crops. They also drown out conversations that we should be having... but never do.

Take a look at the relief camps. The imagery is depressingly familiar: overcrowded schools that have been turned into shelters, muddy clothes, stagnant water, and general hopelessness. The news reports are always the same. Numbers are tallied: millions are displaced, hundreds are dead, and thousands have been rescued. A bureaucrat quotes figures like a cricket commentator reeling off scorecards. But where are the women in this narrative?

They're right there, in those Some camps. are pregnant, most are exhausted, and an alarming number are untreated. Young mothers are nursing babies on dirty sheets. Young women are grappling with their periods with no sanitary pads, no privacy, and no bathrooms. In a land where menstruation is still whispered about like a state secret. expected to women are somehow figure it out through a flood...that too without mentioning it.

We like to talk about 'resilience' as if it's an endless natural resource that Pakistani women have. It is not. Resilience doesn't cure infections.

It also doesn't replace lost medication. Neither does it build toilets in relief camps. And resilience certainly doesn't give a pregnant girl sitting in a makeshift camp in Chung on the outskirts of Lahore, the comfort of knowing she'll survive childbirth in a disaster zone.

Climate change is making floods deadlier, but it's also making the silence around women's suffering louder. Our media must stop treating women in floods as background props in a tragedy. Their stories are not footnotes. They are one of the main stories.

The question is: will we keep counting bodies and livestock, or will we finally start counting the cost women silently pay in every disaster? Until the press, politicians, and armchair know-italls begin to talk about this, the women in those camps will remain unseen, unheard, and most importantly, unreported.

### SINDH HIGH COURT SUSPENDS ORDER REMOVING KE CEO

The Sindh High Court (SHC) on Friday suspended an order by the provincial ombudsman for protection against harassment of women removing K-Electric (KE) Chief Executive Officer Moonis Alvi from his position over allegations of sexual harassment. A day prior, the ombudsman ordered the removal of KE CEO Alvi after finding him guilty of workplace harassment.Alvi, along with other KE employees, was accused of workplace harassment by the company's former chief marketing and communication officer, Mahreen Aziz Khan, read the order issued by provincial ombudsman retired Justice Shahnawaz Tariq.

### SUSPECTS IN SIDRA'S CASE GRANTED FOUR-DAY **REMAND**

Duty Civil Judge Shama Yasin has granted a further four-day physical remand of the six suspects arrested in the murder case of 17-year-old Sidra Bibi, who was suffocated to death in the name of "honour" in Fauji Colony on the orders of a local jirga. Those remanded include Sidra's father, brother, husband, father-in-law, and the head of the jirga who allegedly issued the death order. The judge has directed the police to complete the investigation and present the suspects again on Saturday, August 9, while clarifying that no further remand will be granted.

### PCB AWARDS 65 WOMEN PLAYERS WITH DOMESTIC CONTRACTS FOR 2025-26 SEASON

The Pakistan Cricket Board (PCB) on Thursday announced domestic contracts for 65 women cricketers, including 23 U19 and emerging players, for the season 2025-26. The contracts, for the first time, have been categorised into Gold and Silver with 20 and 45 players awarded, respectively, PCB said in a <a href="mailto:statement">statement</a>. The contracts will run from July 2025 to June 2026, during which a number of domestic and U19 tournaments are scheduled. The Women's National Selection Committee, comprising former Test Cricketer Asad Shafiq and former Pakistan Women's International cricketer Batool Fatima, recommended the names of the 65 players.
