EDITOR'S NOTE

The HPV Vaccine and What the Media Missed

On the surface, the recent HPV vaccine campaign that targeted girls between the ages of 9 and 14 was a positive step forward. It aimed to protect young girls from the human papillomavirus which is a leading cause of cervical cancer. The campaign also sought to normalise conversations around preventive healthcare for women.

The media's response, however, was mixed. Paid content and public service announcements appeared across print and television. This did the crucial job of spreading awareness and encouraging parents to get their daughters vaccinated. Some news platforms also produced meaningful coverage and explainer videos that reinforced the importance of the campaign's message.

But as the campaign moved online, it hit the wall of misinformation. Social media was flooded with negative and often vile comments, in particular after a political figure publicly shared that his daughter had been vaccinated. Once again, baseless (but familiar) claims about 'infertility' began circulating. The 'infertility' narrative has been used to resist polio drops and other immunisation drives in the past.

What was missing from much of the media coverage, however, was context. While some social media spaces spread misinformation about declining fertility, the reality is quite the opposite. Pakistan's population continues to grow at an alarming rate. Fear-mongering about infertility in a country struggling with overpopulation is simply illogical.

EDITOR'S NOTE

There was another glaring flaw in the framing of the campaign. The HPV virus is transmitted through men, yet boys were completely excluded from this vaccination drive. It's hard to understand why a virus that is spread by both genders is treated as only a women's issue. If we are serious about prevention, why are young boys not part of the conversation? Why do this and other health initiatives (and the narratives around them) place the burden of responsibility on women and girls? Why are men left out of the conversation.

It's time for the media to ask harder questions. Because awareness campaigns that leave half the population out of the equation are incomplete and are simply reinforcing the same biases that have long defined our approach to public health.

PAKISTAN TO LAUNCH FIRST NATIONAL GENDER PARITY REPORT IN 2026

The National Commission on the Status of Women (NCSW), in collaboration with UNFPA, UN Women, Group Development Pakistan and the Embassy of the Netherlands, has concluded a two-day national consultation to finalise a unified framework for Pakistan's first-ever National Gender Parity Report, scheduled for launch on International Women's Day, March 8, 2026.For the first time, Pakistan's gender-related data will be synchronised at the national level in line with international standards. Officials said the initiative is expected to strengthen national policies on women's empowerment and improve the country's standing in the World Economic Forum's Global Gender Gap Report.

PAKISTAN'S FIRST ALL-WOMEN EXPEDITION SCALES 5,400M BARI LA PEAK

Pakistan's mountaineering history reached a new milestone on Thursday as the country's first all-women expedition successfully summited the 5,400-meter Bari La Peak in Gilgit-Baltistan. The climb, organised by the Alpine Club of Pakistan to mark its Golden Jubilee, brought together women from every corner of the country — a rare display of unity and empowerment on the nation's highest frontiers. The team was led by Bibi Afzoon and included Mona Khan, a journalist from Islamabad, along with Amina Shabbir of Islamabad.

REPORT EXPOSES FORCED CONVERSIONS THROUGH MARRIAGE

The National Commission for Human Rights (NCHR), in collaboration with the Legal Aid Society (LAS), on Monday launched a research report and documentary examining the drivers of forced conversions September through marriages (FCM) and their impact on survivors, minority communities, and wider society. The launch took place at a national dialogue in Islamabad, which brought together legal experts, rights activists, and criminal justice professionals to discuss practical steps for tackling the issue. Justice Dr Syed Muhammad Anwer attended the ceremony as a chief guest.

IMAAN MOVES SJC AGAIN AFTER REMOVAL OF WOMAN JUDGE FROM HARASSMENT BODY

Advocate Imaan Zainab Mazari-Hazir approached the Supreme Judicial Council (SJC) again on Tuesday, with a complaint against the removal of Justice Saman Rafat Imtiaz as the competent authority regarding workplace harassment at the Islamabad High Court (IHC). The judge was stripped of her powers by IHC Chief Justice Sarfaraz Dogar, hours after she took cognisance of a complaint against him. The episode stems from a terse exchange between Justice Dogar and Ms Mazari last week, where the former reportedly used threatening and misogynistic language.

PAKISTAN'S STRUGGLE FOR WOMEN'S RIGHTS

Over the last two decades, Pakistan has seen major legislative changes in the areas of gender-based violence and harassment. The legislative changes are remarkable in the context of deep patriarchy and parochialism that permeates Pakistan's society and culture. The legal developments are the product of a combination of factors, not least of which is a strong women's rights movement that has consistently demanded that the state act to protect and promote the rights of women. A frequent refrain in political and social commentary in Pakistan is that these laws, while transformative on paper, have not translated to actual change in the lives of women and girls because of poor implementation.

LADY HEALTH WORKER PART OF HPV VACCINATION TEAM BEATEN UP IN MANDI BAHAUDDIN: FIR

A lady health worker, part of a vaccination team for the Human Papillomavirus (HPV) immunisation campaign for girls, was beaten up by local women in Mandi Bahauddin on Thursday, police said. Speaking to Dawn.com, Kuthiala Sheikhan Police Station House Officer (SHO) Sabir Hussain Sindhu said that the incident took place in Chak No 38. "LHW Ghulam Sughra was beaten up by local women while the vaccination campaign was being carried out at a school," he said, adding that the health worker was also thrown to the ground during the assault.

SCOOTIES DISTRIBUTED AMONG WOMEN



80PC OF PAKISTAN ARMY FIELDS NOW OPEN TO FEMALE RECRUITS, NA TOLD

The National Assembly was informed Monday that eighty percent fields in the Pakistan Army are open for the recruitment of females. Responding to a question during the Question Hour in the House, Parliamentary Secretary for Defence Zeb Jaffar further said over five thousand ladies are serving in the Pakistan Army and around seven hundred have been commissioned during the last three years. She, however, said fields entailing extreme physical endurance and prolonged exposure to hostile environment are closed for women.

#SamiyaHijab

Social media influencer Samiya Hijab accused a man named Hassan Zahid of trying to forcibly take her into his car outside her home in Islamabad. CCTV footage of the incident went viral, showing her resisting as he allegedly snatched her phone and attempted to drag her into the vehicle. Samiya stated that the man had been harassing and threatening her for several days before the attack. The video quickly spread online, sparking outrage and calls for justice, while police arrested the suspect within 24 hours of the incident.



#ImaanMazariHazir

Lawyer and Activist Imaan Zainab Mazari-Hazir faced several legal and political controversies. She and her husband, Hadi Ali Chattha, were booked under the Anti-Terrorism Act for removing road barriers during the England cricket team's visit and later faced charges under PECA for alleged "anti-state" tweets. Imaan also filed a harassment complaint against Islamabad High Court Chief Justice Sarfraz Dogar, accusing him of making gendered remarks during a hearing. These incidents sparked national debate over women's rights, free speech, and judicial conduct in Pakistan.
